



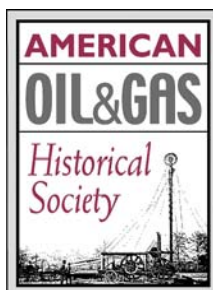
Dedicated to Preserving U.S. E&P Heritage

Communities across the nation proudly celebrate their oil and natural exploration and production heritage. Every summer for the last 20 years, downtown Seminole, Okla., has come alive with "Gusher Days." The Pioneer Oil Museum in Bolivar, N.Y., celebrates the state's earliest wells. In Kilgore, the "Derrick Days," festival recognizes the profound influence of Columbus Marion "Dad" Joiner's 1930 discovery. The East Texas Oil Museum will celebrate the well's 75th anniversary next year.

The American Oil & Gas Historical Society (AOGHS) is dedicated to preserving the history of U.S. oil and natural gas exploration and production by promoting the exhibits of community museums like this one in Kilgore, Texas. The Society, a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit membership organization, works with state and regional museums, historical societies and industry associations to promote community "oil and gas history days," oilfield exhibits, and educational programs.
